



2021 Water Supply Outlook

At the North Unit Irrigation District (NUID) Regular Board of Directors Meeting held on March 9, 2021, the NUID board set a tentative irrigation season start date and irrigation supply allotment. Water will begin to be diverted in Bend on Saturday, April 3, with water being available to most NUID water users on Friday, April 9. Water users above Haystack Reservoir (south of Haystack) can begin placing water orders on the NUID Patron Portal (online) or contact their ditchrider by phone between the hours of 6:30am and 7:30am on the morning of Friday, April 9. Water users below Haystack Reservoir (north of Haystack) that want water on Friday, April 9, will need to place their water order on the NUID Patron Portal (online) or call the NUID office the prior day (Thursday, April 8) before 5:00pm. The same water order schedule noted above, 6:30am - 7:30am. above Haystack and before 5:00pm below Haystack, will be followed throughout the irrigation season.

It goes without saying that this will be yet another challenging and difficult year for NUID and its patrons. Any action water users can take to minimize early season use or demand will help ease the need for early irrigation supply releases from Wickiup Reservoir. Similarly, any measures to conserve water throughout the irrigation season will have a great impact on how the 2021 irrigation season plays out and reservoir storage for the 2022 irrigation season.



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Water Allotment

On March 9, 2021, the NUID board of directors set the 2021 irrigation season allotments at 1.00 acre-foot per acre for Deschutes River and 0.50 acre-foot per acre for Crooked River. This restricted allotment is based on current and projected water supply conditions. NUID will closely monitor conditions throughout the season and may modify allotments and operations as warranted based on supply conditions.

Minimum Water Orders

Please note, all water orders shall be a minimum of 0.10 cfs with the only exception being those with orifice deliveries. Any water order for less than 0.10 cfs shall be recorded as an order of 0.10 cfs and charged accordingly. Please refer to NUID Resolution No. 2020-6 for further information.

Customer Water Portal

Don't forget you can track your water usage and place **water orders**, all online!

For those who have yet to sign up, please visit the NUID website at <http://www.northunitid.com/customer-portal>, for instructions on how to sign up.

You will need a unique key code to set up your account. This key code was sent out to customers by mail last fall. If you missed or misplaced it, please call the district office at (541) 475-3625 and staff will be happy to assist you.

Once your account is set up, you can track your water usage in **real time!** Accounts are updated daily. In addition to placing and managing your water orders, you can also review many of your land-use records.

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Delinquent Accounts & Lien Process

As a reminder, the district sends delinquent letters to all unpaid accounts as of May 15 each year. A notice of intent to lien will be sent to delinquent accounts on July 15, or the first business day thereafter, each year. If payment is not received within 30 days, a notice of claim of lien will be filed on August 15 of each year with the recording officer of the county in which the land is located, pursuant to ORS 545.494. The district's lien process includes assessing fees for placing and removing liens as well as other related administrative fees. The administrative fee is set at \$150 per

account. Pursuant to ORS 545.496 the district will withhold delivery of water from any tract of land until all charges are paid in full including interest, lien fees, collection costs, and administrative fees.

For your convenience the district accepts payments via Visa, Mastercard, American Express, Discover and E-Check. The payment is processed through Point & Pay, a third party processing center that charges a convenience fee. Canal Safety

Each year NUID presents a canal safety program promoting the awareness of hidden dangers in and around canals. Second graders from Madras, Metolius, and Culver schools are provided a slide show of the hidden dangers within the district and a video of Otto the Otter's Scary Rescue. Students are provided a coloring book and prizes at the end of the presentation.

Notice of Intent to Use Herbicide

Application of aquatic herbicides to District irrigation canals can begin as early as April and continue periodically through October of any given year. The aquatic herbicides used may include: Copper Sulfate, Cascade and Magnacide H with the active ingredient Acrolien. The herbicide applications are intended to control aquatic weeds and algae growth within canals, ditches, and laterals.

Weed Control

In preparation for the 2021 irrigation season, district employees have been performing controlled burns in ditches and along the main canal. In order to ensure burns are carried out efficiently, remove all wheel-lines, hand-lines, equipment, livestock fences, and any other items from canal easements. You can check the location of an easement on your property by stopping by the district office.

The district is not responsible for damaged property left within the district's easements.

Ownership of Land Within a Reclamation District

North Unit Irrigation District is a Bureau of Reclamation project; as such there are ownership entitlements that must be adhered to in accordance with the Reclamation Reform Act (RRA), of October 12, 1982. This act placed limitations on the amount of land a landholder may own within a Reclamation project located in the 17 western states.

If a landholder is a qualified recipient (individuals, married couples, entities ultimately benefiting 25 or less natural persons), your ownership entitlement is 960 acres. If a landholder is a limited recipient (entities ultimately benefiting more

than 25 natural persons, example: government agencies, large corporations) your ownership entitlement is 640 acres (other restrictions may apply).

If you purchase land with water right acres over and above your ownership entitlement it becomes "Excess Land". Excess lands are not eligible to receive Reclamation irrigation water. In order for excess land to receive Reclamation irrigation water, it must be sold at a price approved by Reclamation; this is a very slow and expensive process.

Under the district's contract with

Reclamation, landowners have the option to do a construction obligation payout, which would allow ownership of land over your entitlement. Payout must take place prior to exceeding your ownership entitlement. Please contact the District office if you have concerns regarding your entitlement, payout questions or rates.



Reclamation Reform Act

The Reclamation Reform Act (RRA) requires anyone who owns and/or leases 240 acres or more in a District under contract to the Bureau of Reclamation is required to submit certification forms before water delivery. This means that even if you own and/or lease less than 240 acres in North Unit Irrigation District but also own and/or lease in another Bureau of Reclamation District with your total acres adding up to 240 or more, you will need to fill out a certification form. The exception is for a public entity to report if they own and/or lease 40 acres or more. If you were previ-

ously required to complete certification forms, you should have received a separate letter, which addresses RRA issues in more detail. If you did not receive a letter and feel you may need to complete certification forms, please contact our office.

PLEASE NOTE: If you have any ownership and or lease changes during the irrigation season a new RRA form is required. It needs to be completed and on file with the district on or before the effective date of the change.

Paying For Water

If the district determines there is a shortage of water for an irrigation season, the board will set an allotment. This is the total amount of per-acre water the water user can use for the irrigation season. Most years, water users who are not going to use all of their allotment can assign their allotment, or portion thereof, to another water user. Please contact the district office to obtain the forms necessary to make such an assignment.

There's been a lot of commentary recently about "why am I having to pay my full assessment for only half the water". The answer is that your annual assessment isn't "paying for water" but for the utilization of the water that's available and the costs associated with that utilization (see district charges on last page of newsletter.) The only time a water user "pays for water" is when the water user is in excess of contract amounts or usage amounts greater than 2.00 acre-feet of Deschutes water rights or 1.00 acre foot of Crooked River water rights.

The district understands these are difficult times for many and is always mindful of the impacts water shortages can have on district water users in addition to the associated annual assessments.

Animal Traps

Recently, animal traps have been found in various locations within the district and its easements. It is imperative that animal traps are removed and kept out of district easements and working areas for the safety of NUID employees and others. Unauthorized animal traps will be confiscated if not removed.

Non-Potable Water

NUID irrigation water is considered non-potable water and is unsafe for human consumption. Do not use irrigation water for drinking, bathing, showering, dishwashing, cooking or maintaining oral hygiene. Water delivered through the district's canals and delivery systems is for irrigation purposes only.



Accepting Applications for our Plotting for Pollinators Program!

Who gets seed? It's first come, first serve while supplies lasts. We prioritize fields growing hybrid carrot seed interested in joining an ongoing research study with Oregon State University. We also encourage growers interested in planting along the peripheral edges of their commercial agriculture fields and irrigation ponds.



When are they due? Applications are due April 15, 2021.

HEMP UPDATE

In December 2020, Congress extended state industrial hemp pilot programs through December 31, 2021. That means that for the 2021 irrigation season, hemp growers will be in compliance with federal law if they have a current hemp producer's license from either the Oregon Department of Agriculture or the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The decision to extend the state pilot programs is related, at least in part, to the fact that a number of states have not yet submitted plans to USDA for approval - Oregon is among those states. HB 2281, currently pending before the Oregon House Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources, would direct ODA to prepare a state plan for USDA approval.

Before you can receive NUID water for hemp production NUID must have a copy of your license or permit on file. For more information and application see www.oregon.gov/oda/programs/Hemp/Pages/HempGrowers.aspx

District Charges

Operation and Maintenance Charge (O&M) - covers costs to operate and maintain the district.

Account Charge - covers administrative costs incurred by the district.

Legal/NEPA/OSF/CR Special Assessment - legal fees, which include NEPA, the Oregon spotted frog matters, Crooked River legislation implementation and communications for these issues.

Construction - repayment to the Bureau or Reclamation for the construction of the project.

Safety of Dams - the modifications on Wickiup Dam completed by the Bureau of Reclamation 2004.
